Venue

The opening ceremony for the Congress, the Women's Conference, Central Committee and Executive Committee meetings and the Congress itself will take place in the Göteborg Convention Centre Congress Hall. The Finance Committee, Resolutions Committee and Action Programme Committee meetings will be held in room J1 on Level 2 of the venue.

Entrance to the main Congress Hall is through gate number 8 (Massans Gata 8).

Please note that there is **no smoking inside the venue** at all. A smoking balcony can be accessed from the Congress Hall lobby.

Swedish IMF Affiliates

The Swedish affiliates are IF Metall, Unionen and Sveriges Ingenjörer. All three affiliates have cooperated closely with the IMF.

Transport to and from the airport

A Welcome Service Stand will be placed in the arrival hall near the baggage claim. Volunteers from the host affiliates will welcome guests and inform them of arrangements for transfer to their hotels.

The IMF has organized a dedicated bus for the days most Congress delegates are scheduled to arrive. Volunteers at the airport welcome desk will direct arriving delegates to the bus on the days it is available.

Alternatively the Flygbussarna (Airport Bus www.flygbussarna.se) travels into the city every 15 minutes during peak hours. Taxis usually have a fixed rate to the city center. Catering during Congress

Permanent tea and coffee stations will be available throughout the Congress for delegates and participants.

Lunch will not be provided for participants during the official Congress days. During May 25-27 the restaurant Estrad on level 2 will be open for the delegates between 12.00 and 14.00, with no reservations needed. During other times reservations should be made as far as possible.

On Wednesday May 27th when Congress will not stop for lunch, delegates will be able to purchase a late lunch after 2 pm at the restaurants Incontro and Heaven 23.

ESTRAD

Insurance

All Congress participants are insured against accidents during the Congress. Accidents should be immediately reported to the IMF Secretariat in room R4. In addition, it is important to note that all participants are requested to make their own arrangements to be covered by insurance for sickness.

GUIDE TO THE IMF CONGRESS

Introduction

The IMF Congress is the highest authority of the IMF. By nature it is a large, international meeting involving around 700 delegates and at least 16 languages.

These features put certain constraints on the way that the Congress must be conducted in order to minimise confusion and maximise results. The greatest care is taken to ensure that delegates understand at all times what is happening. The IMF currently has 8 "official" languages as determined by the Executive Committee. These are English, Spanish, French, German, Italian, Swedish, Russian and Japanese. Simultaneous interpretation is provided into and out of these languages, using the interpretation equipment. A separate guide for speakers at IMF meetings is included in your congress bag. You will also notice interpreters sitting with Congress delegates and providing whispering translation for additional languages.

Delegates

How many delegates may an affiliate send to Congress?

Each affiliate makes its own decision about how many delegates it will send. A delegate may also represent other affiliated unions from the same country, if authorised in writing to do so.

Registration

What happens when I register?

Every delegate, guest, observer, IMF Secretariat and Regional Office member needs to register in order to receive a nametag. Without registering and receiving your nametag you will not be able to attend any meetings or move freely around the Congress venue.

How do I register?

For pre-Congress meetings to be held prior to May 21 (Secretariat, IMF Regional Office, Resolutions, Rules and Action Programme), registration will take place prior to the meeting in the foyer opposite the meeting venue J1. The desk will be clearly marked and divided according to the various meetings to take place.

For all other meetings and the Congress proper, delegates are to register at the Registration and Information desk located in the Congress lobby. Registration will be divided according to language which will be clearly marked.

The registration desk will be open Friday May 22, 08.00 – 17.00, Saturday May 23, 08.00 - 17.00, Sunday 24, 08.30 – 14.00 and Monday 25, 08.00 – 12.00.

Delegates who are unable to register before noon on Monday 25th should contact the Information desk in the Congress Hall lobby.

Please note that delegates who do not register by noon on Monday May 25 will miss the deadline for accreditation and will not be eligible to vote in Congress elections.

Delegates are requested to ensure they arrive at Congress and prior meetings early enough to register before proceedings commence.

What will I receive when I register?

As well as your nametag, you will receive a Congress kit containing all available Congress papers, and a variety of other materials.

Those who need to register before the finalisation of all Congress papers will be able to collect additional papers from the Information Desk or on your table in the meeting room.

Resolutions and Motions

How can I put a resolution to the Congress?

Resolutions on subjects not already covered by the Resolutions Committee, due to technical reasons, will be accepted in writing, until noon, May 25, 2009. They will be discussed by the Resolutions Committee (11 members) and reported to the Congress. In practice, this means handing in a copy of your resolution at the Information Desk.

Can resolutions be amended from the floor?

No.

What does the Resolutions Committee do?

It determines the final wording of resolutions that will be put to a vote of Congress, for example when resolutions that have been debated by Congress need to be changed prior to a vote or when two similar resolutions on the same topic need to be combined.

How do I put procedural motions?

If you have not already spoken on an agenda point, you may move a procedural motion to close the debate or to close the list of speakers. You may also move a procedural motion to suspend or amend the standing orders. These need not be in writing. No speeches are allowed on procedural motions.

IMF Rules

Can I propose an amendment to the Rules?

Any proposed rule changes must be submitted to the Rules Committee before April 15 2009. Proposals that are received by 15 April 2009 will then be reviewed by the Rules Committee at its meeting in Gothenburg on 19 May 2009.

Those proposals that are accepted by the Rules Committee will be incorporated into the draft Rules for consideration at the Congress.

Nevertheless, if there are cases in which the Rules Committee have rejected any of the proposals for amendments that were submitted before 15 April 2009, affiliates still have the right to raise the proposal again from the floor at Congress.

Only those proposals that were received in writing before 15 April 2009 will be considered in the Congress.

Action Programme

Can I propose an amendment to the Action Programme?

This year Congress will consider a new set of proposed standing orders, which were circulated in February.

According to the proposed standing orders, the Action Programme Committee will review proposed amendments to the draft Action Programme received by the IMF prior to the 15th of April 2009.

Those proposals accepted by the Action Programme Committee shall be incorporated in the draft Action Programme for consideration at the Congress.

Nevertheless, if there are cases in which the Action Programme Committee had rejected any of the proposals for amendment that were submitted before 15 April 2009, affiliates still have the right to raise the proposal again from the floor at the Congress.

Speaking

How can I speak at the Congress?

You must inform the Chair in writing that you wish to speak. This can be done by means of the "Request to speak" forms that are included in your Congress bag. Please ensure you clearly mark which agenda item you wish to speak to. For example, Agenda item 11.1.1, Discussion and adoption of Section 3.1, Build strong national trade unions. If your form is not clearly marked it may cause a delay in your listing as a speaker. Please ask the Congress staff if you have any questions.

Speakers are requested to ensure their contributions are confined to the relevant item.

You can only place a request to speak once the relevant agenda point has been opened for discussion. For example, once the item on the Action Programme has been opened you may notify your intention to speak during the debate, even if this may not be until later in the day or even the next day. Speakers will be given the floor in order of their request.

All speakers from the floor will address the Congress from a single rostrum on the stage. The Chair will notify speakers ahead of time to make their way to the front of the stage where seats will be set aside in the front row. The upcoming speakers list will also be displayed on a large screen in the Congress Hall.

How long may I speak?

Speakers from the floor will be allowed an absolute maximum of ten minutes to speak. However further time limits may be imposed at the discretion of the Chair.

May I speak twice on the same agenda point?

Delegates may only speak twice on the same agenda point if every other delegate wishing to speak on that point has been given an opportunity to do

so. Movers of resolutions will be given the right of reply at the close of the debate.

Please see the "Speakers Notes" in your Congress bag for more information and tips.

Voting

Can all affiliated unions vote?

No, only those affiliates that have "fulfilled their obligation" to the IMF may vote. In practice this means that their subscription payments are up to date through to 2008.

How are votes conducted?

An indicative vote is initially conducted by show of hands. If the outcome of the vote is not clear from this process, tellers conduct a full vote by counting the number of votes for which each affiliate is eligible.

How many votes does an affiliate have?

Each affiliate has the same number of votes as the number of its members declared to IMF for the purpose of calculating its subscription. Each affiliate votes as a block with the leader of the delegation declaring how the block will vote.

How many votes are needed for adoption?

Reports, the Action Programme, motions and resolutions are adopted by a simple majority. Rule changes require a two thirds majority of the eligible votes, as do amendments to or suspension of the Standing Orders. All elections require a simple majority.

What is quorum?

Quorum is the percentage of eligible voters that must be present in order for a vote to be valid. At Congress, this is 50%.

Can our organisation represent other organisations in the vote?

According to Article 3.2.G. of the IMF Rules, affiliates may be represented by other organisations belonging to the same country. Affiliates that wish to be represented by another organisation should send the IMF Secretariat a letter in advance authorising which affiliate will represent them by proxy during Congress.

Elections

Which positions are elected by Congress?

The President, the General Secretary, Executive Committee members and Auditing Committee members.

How are nominations for positions made?

Nominations are made in writing to the IMF General Secretary. Nominations will close at 12.00 noon on May 25.

How are elections conducted?

Based on nominations submitted by affiliates elections are conducted at the Congress.

Central Committee

How does the Central Committee differ from Congress?

The Central Committee is composed in the same way as Congress, in that each affiliate that has fulfilled its obligations, is entitled to send as many delegates as it chooses. However, it is the Central Committee, rather than the Congress, that designates one or more Assistant General Secretaries. It also approves the annual accounts and sets up Congress committees. The Central Committee also deals with affiliations and expulsions from the IMF.

EXCURSION PROGRAMME, THURSDAY 28 MAY

Älvsborgs Fortress Tour Day Trip

The day starts at approximately 11:00 with a bus transfer from your hotel to Lilla Bommen. A boat will be waiting to take the participants to the beautiful Älvsborgs Fortress. During the 30 minute trip the participants will enjoy impressive views of the fort which is located on an isolated island. On arrival lunch will be served followed by a guided tour of the island and the fortress. Participants will also have the opportunity to explore the island on their own. After approx 3 hours on the island participants will return to Gothenburg by boat, arriving at approximately 15:00. Buses will return participants to their hotels.

PROGRAMME FOR ACCOMPANYING PERSONS

Monday May 25

City Tour (5 hours)

A guided bus takes us around the famous old and new sights of Gothenburg. The tour ends in the centre of the city, where we will have 2-3 hours for shopping at Nordstan, Sweden's largest and most diverse shopping centre. The tour ends with lunch.

Tuesday May 26

The Paddan Tour (2 hours)

The classic city tour on the Paddan boats shows off the beauty of Gothenburg from a waterside perspective. Step aboard at the Swedish Exhibition Centre. See the old moat and canals, in the centre of the city, while learning about the history of the city's construction and defence.

The guided tour continues beneath the many low bridges, including the extremely low Osthyveln ("cheese slicer") bridge, which brings us out into the fascinating harbor with traditional shipyards, the fishing harbor, new and old housing, expanding commercial and academic sites and maritime museum.

**PROPOSED STANDING ORDERS
(Draft)**

1. The President, the Vice-President and the General Secretary will constitute the Standing Committee of the Congress. They, together with Congress delegates designated by the Standing Committee, shall chair the Congress.
2. The Credentials Committee (7 members) shall check the credentials of the delegates and report to the Congress.
3. Seven Tellers shall be appointed to count votes.
4. Proceedings of the Congress shall be recorded in minutes.
5. A delegate or member of the Secretariat, desiring to speak must inform the Chair in writing of their intention to speak. The speakers will be given the floor in the order of their requests. The time for speaking shall be limited to 20 minutes for those making reports, 10 minutes for those moving the resolutions and ten minutes for all other speakers. Reporters can be given the floor out of the regular order of the speakers' list.
6. No delegate shall be allowed to speak twice on any issue until all delegates desirous to speak have had a chance to speak.

MOTIONS

7. A motion shall not be opened for discussion until the motion has been duly accepted by the Chair. Motions to be discussed, other than motions of order, must be presented in writing. The mover of the original motion shall have the right of reply at the close of the debate upon such motion. The question shall then be put to the vote immediately and under no circumstances shall any further discussion be allowed.

8. The motion to close debate may be moved and seconded only by members who have not previously spoken at any time during the debate. No speeches shall be allowed on such motions and the list of remaining speakers shall be announced prior to the voting on the motion to close debate (motion to close the list of speakers is admissible).

ACTION PROGRAMME

9. The Action Programme shall be subject to discussion and decision. The discussion will be organised in themes. A number of paragraphs will be discussed under each theme and be subject to decision.

Any affiliate who wishes to make amendments to the draft Action Programme should send its proposals in writing to the IMF by 15 April 2009.

Proposals shall be reviewed by the Action Programme Committee.

Those proposals accepted by the Action Programme Committee shall be incorporated in the draft Action Programme for consideration at the Congress.

Nevertheless, if there were cases in which the Action Programme Committee had rejected any of the proposals for amendment that were submitted before 15 April 2009, affiliates still have the right to raise the proposal again from the floor at the Congress.

Each paragraph shall be adopted by a majority of votes, as provided in Article 3.2.I & J of the Rules of the Federation.

RESOLUTIONS

10. Resolutions shall be subject to discussion and decision.

Resolutions on subjects not already covered by the Resolutions Committee, due to technical reasons, will be accepted in writing, until noon, May 25, 2009. They will be discussed by the Resolutions Committee (11 members) and reported to the Congress.

Resolutions must be adopted by a majority of votes, as provided in Article 3.2.I & J of the Rules of the Federation.

RULES

11. Changes in the Rules of the Federation, submitted to the Rules Committee (9 members) in accordance with Article 3.3.K of the Rules of the Federation, shall be reported to the Congress by the Rules Committee.

Alterations to the Rules shall require a two-thirds majority, in accordance with Article 3.2.N of the Rules of the Federation.

12. 50 per cent of the votes shall constitute quorum.

STANDING ORDERS

13. The Standing Orders may be amended or suspended only by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present.
